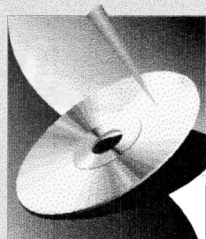

PRIZE PUZZLE CORNER

The puzzle this month is on the Cover Disk as a computer program called MAZE3. (If you do not have the Cover Disk you can get a copy of the program from the web site. Go to:- www.iwpcug.org/davidbro/puz0309.htm where there is a link to the exe file. The program is quite short (52 kbytes) and does not require "installing" -- just run it under DOS or double click the Windows icon after you have downloaded it to your hard disk.)

This is a three-dimensional maze but because three-dimensional mazes are usually very difficult, this one uses only two levels or "floors". You swap the view between upstairs and the ground floor by pressing the space bar and you can see all the "stairways" (i.e. passages between the two floors) in one view (unlike a real maze, say in a building, where you would only see the passages around you).

When you have got out of the maze you will be given the secret code word to prove you did it. Send that code word to me (see August Hot Key page 3 for addresses) by 1st October to be entered into the prize draw.

SOLUTION TO THE JULY PUZZLE

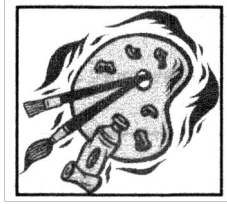
This puzzle was to find the ages of five members of a family. From a mathematical point of view it was a problem of solving a set of simultaneous linear equations in five unknowns which is not trivial but because all the answers were whole numbers and had to be realistic to the ages of an actual family it was much easier. I had seven solutions from members, all correct. The answers were: Dad 27; Mum 23; Gerald 4; Fred 3 and Angela 1.

Recommended Websites

Free Memory Diagnostic Tool

The free "Windows Memory Diagnostic" from Microsoft is actually a DOS-like low-level tool that runs on any system based on Intel Pentiums or Celerons; AMD K6s, Athlons, or Durons; and other "x86" compatible CPUs. The download file contains both the tool and a kind of installer application that lets you automatically create a special-purpose boot floppy, or an ISO image you can burn to a boot CD. You then boot from the floppy or CD, and the memory diagnostic tool will run automatically. The test can pinpoint the failure location, so you'll know exactly which RAM module is giving you trouble.
